WHO WE ARE

We are a feminist organization that is dedicated to ending domestic and sexual violence, providing support services, and advocating for survivors who move through the court system in the Central Okanagan Valley. Central Okanagan Elizabeth Fry Society achieves this purpose through a variety of prevention and intervention services in collaboration with community partners.

OUR PROGRAMS

YOUTH PREVENTION

Programs available to girls, boys, non-binary & LGBTQIA2S+ youth.

SPECIALIZED VICTIM ASSISTANCE

Crisis response, risk assessment, safety planning, court support & accompaniment, practical, mental & emotional support to adult & child victims of domestic & sexual violence.

HIGHEST RISK DOMESTIC VIOLENCE RESPONSE

COEFS works with RCMP Domestic Violence Unit, Women's Shelter, Corrections & Child Protection to intervene when there is an assessed risk of serious bodily harm or death.

SEXUAL ASSAULT COUNSELLING CENTRE

Through the Adult Counselling Program (ACP) & Sexual Abuse Intervention Program (SAIP), we provide individual & group trauma-informed therapy for adult, youth & child survivors of sexual violence.

VICTIM SERVICES OUTREACH

Mobile short-term counselling & services for at-risk women.

INDIGENOUS OUTREACH

Dedicated Outreach & Victim Services for Indigenous survivors of domestic & sexual violence.

WOMEN'S COMMUNITY JUSTICE PROGRAM

Provides legal information, resources & support from pre-charge to post incarceration for criminalized women.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND AWARENESS OF SEXUAL EXPLOITATION (CEASE)

Provides presentations, workshops and information to create awareness about sexual exploitation.

Message from our Executive Director & Board Chair

The 2020-2021 year has been a unique and challenging year for all of us as individuals and as an organization supporting survivors of violence. When the pandemic closures began in March 2020, the thought of the risks and challenges impacting lives today has quite frankly, been surreal. Despite these challenges, we have learned to adapt, innovate, and move forward. This past year has highlighted the importance of being vigilant in our vision to support and empower all survivors of domestic abuse, sexual exploitation, and violence.

While 1 in 3 women and 1 in 6 men will experience physical domestic and/or sexual violence, the grim reality of these statistics is that somebody that you know or yourself has experienced an act of abuse (World Health Organization). In this past year, COVID-19 has played a drastic contribution to these statistics and highlighted the needs of so many experiencing gender-based violence in a time of pandemic disruption. Despite isolation and restrictions making it challenging to get those critical supports or to leave unsafe situations, reports continue to indicate the increased rates of survivors requesting help.

The Central Okanagan Elizabeth Fry Society (COEFS) has experienced a drastic increase in demand for services while working with the same or less capacity levels. Unfortunately, large wait times became the norm and new ways to respond were and continue to be foremost in our strategies. While no one could predict the length of the pandemic, it is not surprising to see how many people need vital supports.

We remind ourselves that we have the privilege to work and serve on the unceded territory of the Syilx (Okanagan) peoples. We educate ourselves and acknowledge the history, cultural genocide, sacrifices, and strength of First Nations, Inuit, and Metis people. This past year has highlighted the plight of our Indigenous brothers and sisters and the grief of lost families and children. Discriminatory experiences continue for those who are Indigenous, racialized, LGBTQIA2S+, people with disabilities, and new immigrants. It is no surprise that those experiencing discrimination are at higher risk and incidences of gender-based violence. COEFS is committed to working together to provide the necessary supports that meet cultural and individual needs. We stand in solidarity with those impacted by violence.

During this pandemic year, COEFS provided critical services to 1675 individuals. An additional 11,162 supports were provided via brief services and responses to inquiries all while following restrictions and during a time when courts, schools and many work offices were closed. The challenges of COVID-19, experienced by so many, resulted in new ways of working, personnel changes, and an overall anxiety during these times. Despite these challenges, the year also provided opportunities for growth, innovation and demonstrated the resiliency of our organization and overall community. COEFS continued to make sure survivors of violence remained a top priority and as essential workers in the community, our personnel worked tirelessly to make support services readily available and accessible.

The Board of Directors and I would like to acknowledge the work of everyone at COEFS and of our community partners for their excellence in supporting those in need while working in pandemic times. Thank you for your commitment, courage, and strength! This work can not be done alone. We are continually encouraged and inspired by how our community comes together to make meaningful differences for those in need. We are grateful and we thank you all for your continued support of our mission! Together, we will create a safe community for all!



The homicide rate among Aboriginal people was 6 times higher than that of non-Aboriginal people


